Dear Friends,

As usual, May sees Christian Aid Week ~ this year from 12th to 18th. If you are able to help collecting, let me or June Phillipson know. If you cannot collect, I hope that you will be able at least to give generously towards this cause. We may feel we are in hard times (though to be fair, as someone is supposed to have said a few decades back, "You've never had it so good!").

Over the past few months Christian Aid have been focusing on climate change and the implications of global warming in their magazine. I suppose that as a development and relief agency they are more aware than most of the problems caused by flooding and rising sea levels in such places as Bangla Desh or by droughts and unexpected rainfall patterns in other parts of the world. So, alongside their efforts to relieve the effects of drought or flood they are rightly trying to remind the more comfortable parts of the world that what we do (or fail to limit) will undermine all their and our best efforts.

So, alongside giving to Christian Aid, or other development and relief charities, what things might we do in Northenden to mitigate the effects of global warming? (on the basis that every little helps) What ways are there for us to use or generate renewable energy? Are there places here where tree cover (which both cools the air and absorbs CO₂) can be increased? I am certainly considering what use can be put to a couple of unused plots of church land in Northenden.

Should we be campaigning for the reversal of the well meaning but very short-sighted idea of requiring our cars to be

powered by bio-fuel? That certainly would benefit the poorer nations of the world directly, as well as ourselves perhaps, since the high prices of wheat, rice, &c., which have resulted in part from the dedication of farmland to growing crops for biofuel, hurt them far more than us. (If any land is turned over to grow crops for burning as fuel, shouldn't it be land which is now under tobacco cultivation?)

So, to sum up, please back Christian Aid in your generosity during "the Week", but in these other ways too.

During April the clergy of the diocese had an In Service Training day on the relationship between Christian and Muslim communities. I am not going to try to summarise five hours of quite complicated discussion, interesting though it was. What I will comment on, however, is this. One of our speakers was a university professor who is involved from time to time on national consultations in this field. As such he meets up with Government ministers in informal situations. At one recent meeting a minister shared the fact ~ no secret, but a predictable fact and a cause for concern ~ that over the next year or so there will be one court case after another coming up in which Muslim extremists are brought to trial for alleged terrorist offences. This is simply the consequence of investigations, with arrests made one or two years ago, coming to maturity.

There will be two dangers in this. The first is that members of the Muslim community may well feel threatened because of the adverse publicity. The other is that the publicity for these trials of alleged terrorists will come over as publicity against Islam. It ought not to be handled that way, and if it is, I hope readers of Concord will see through what is scurrilous. In the right context I would explain the theological and religious differences I have with Islam. In this context, however, I believe that Muslim communities are just as likely, perhaps more likely, to be generally law-abiding than many nominally Christian communities. There is a need here for committed Christians to be understanding, conciliatory and constructive in our dealings with Muslims, whether as neighbours, employees, or however. à

And finally, Ascension Day is 1st May, and Whit Sunday the 11th. You could call that coming and going, or rather going and coming. Christ returned to his Father's closer presence in heaven, and in doing so took his understanding of our human nature there too. Put simply, he is able to put in a word for us

with understanding, and he lifts us, as well as our concerns, to the heart of God.

If that is the going, then the coming is the movement of God towards us at Whitsun (Pentecost). The Holy Spirit is God-the-go-between, who brings God's presence and support home to his people ~ those who trust in Jesus. He puts in a word for God, if we let him, in our hearts and lives. That's something for us to think about this Whitsun!

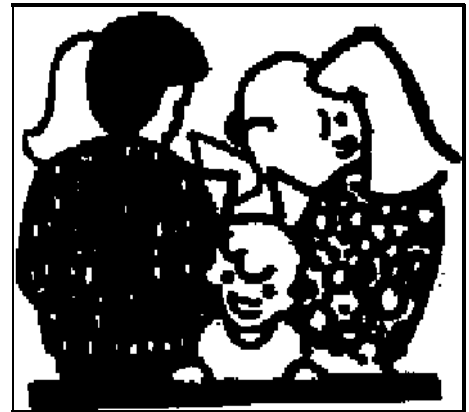

M a g p i e ...

It must be the Marathon season. Nick Bettridge took
on the Paris Marathon in April (it was a week before the London
one, in which Kate Johnstone ran) and put in a creditable time of
3hrs 39mins. He was running on behalf of Médecins sans
Frontières ~ the French aid charity, and he has written a piece for
us elsewhere in this issue. He hopes to raise something like
£2,000 for them. More strength to his elbows ~ or knees!

Magpie understands that the petition about the civil
"Parish Council" for Northenden ~ civil, that is, not churchy,
and still less Dibley ~ has been presented. More strength to
those elbows too! If this is handled wisely it can mean an
effective voice, and some limited practical action, for Northenden.
If it is treated as a political football between the Village and the
City council it will simply mean frustration for Northenden, and
lousy publicity for the City Council and our local City Councillors.
Over 10% of the voters in the village have asked for it.

In March I threw out the idea of putting together a list of birds seen in Northenden. Some more people have taken me up on this during April. One commented on some sparrow-sized olive green birds with yellow wing flashes ~ Greenfinches. Another pointed out three large birds wheeling overhead, coming very close and possibly passing things to one another ~ Buzzards. There's wild for you.

I have also seen quite a lot of the grey Herons who frequent the riverside. They have flown low over the houses, and even perched on the roofs. In the middle ages I think they were sometimes called storks: will we get them nesting on our chimney pots?

Other people have noted the collared doves ~ some people call them ring doves ~ which seem to have come back, after dropping in numbers in the last couple of years. I can remember when they were rare visitors from the continent.

Médecins sans Frontières (MSF) ~ Nick Bettridge

MSF is the leading international non-governmental organisation for emergency medical aid. It is dedicated to providing expert medical relief to victims of war, disasters and epidemics in 80 countries around the world, giving help to those who need it most, regardless of ethnic origin, religion or political affiliation.

MSF has been setting up emergency medical aid missions around the world since 1971. Examples of the better known areas where they are active are Sudan, Zimbabwe, Somalia, Sri Lanka, the Democratic Republic of Congo, and Colombia. Many of these areas are ravaged by war, and vast numbers of the population have been displaced to camps where disease and malnutrition are rife.

MSF volunteers enter these areas at no little risk to themselves and dispense medical and nutritional help to the victims. An MSF member was shot and killed recently, which demonstrates how dangerous these areas can be.

Nick adds; "I hope to raise around £2,000 for the charity through my Marathon run. It was a cold but dry day in Paris, and 29,000 runners started the race. Of these 28,000 finished. I completed the 26.2 miles (42.2 km) in 3 hrs. 39 mins.
